WEEKLY PASSES - Weekly passes are available at the Fair Office and online for \$30.00 from July 7 through August 11th. No weekly passes sold after August 11th. These passes do not include rides. Daily ride passes are available in the C&L Shows Office for all weekly pass holders for \$5.00 each day.

**VEHICLES** - The side and front gates will close to all vehicles at 12PM daily. All gates will be closed from 12AM to 5AM except the "red" side gate.

<u>GOLF CARTS</u> - Must provide proof of insurance through the dates of the fair. All operators must have a valid driver's license. Permits are available at the fair office for \$100 for golf carts. Golf carts must be parked in designated areas only. Serial numbers of golf carts must be included on insurance policy. No ATV's, Side-by-Sides or 4-Wheelers allowed.

**ADMISSION POLICY** - Daily admission is \$10. Admission for Seniors 62 & over on Monday, August 14, 2023, is \$3.00. Admission for Veterans on Tuesday, August 15 is \$3.00. Children 12 & under on Friday, August 18 - \$5.00. Admission includes Shows, Entertainment, Petting Zoo and Free Parking. Rides open at 2PM on Sunday and Monday. 1PM to 11PM all other days, weather permitting. NO REFUNDS OR RAIN CHECKS. Children age 4 and under who do not wish to ride - NO CHARGE.

Exhibitors participating in the 4H and FFA market livestock program will also abide by the rules established by the Washington County Junior Livestock Committee. In order to get an exhibitor pass, you must have an entry in the Fair.

### EXHIBITOR CODE OF CONDUCT

All exhibitors and associated individuals are required to conduct themselves according to the Washington County Fair Exhibitor Code of Conduct. The code operates in conjunction with the rules and regulations of the Washington County Agricultural Fair, Inc. Exhibitors and associated individuals are reminded that they are on public display and at all times and should practice good sportsmanship and present a wholesome image to promote the advancement of agricultural education. The Fair Board reserves the right to amend this code at its discretion. All interpretation and decision by Fair management is final.

- No alcoholic beverages are permitted on the Fairgrounds except those sold and consumed in designated areas. If caught you will be escorted off the fairgrounds immediately.
- No smoking is allowed in the barns or exhibit halls.
- No one is permitted on the Fairgrounds after 12 AM except with a valid night pass. Night passes can be obtained from the department superintendents until 8PM.
- Other conduct deemed inappropriate by the Fair management will not be tolerated.

If the code is violated, the following steps can be taken:

- The individual(s) will be asked to cease the conduct. Prohibited items will be confiscated. Parent (s)/Guardian will be called in the case of minors.
- The individual(s) will be disqualified from show and/or be ineligible for any premiums, awards, and refunds.
- The individual(s) will be asked to leave the Fairgrounds.
- If Pennsylvania laws are violated, the case may be referred to the police.

# **2022 WASHINGTON COUNTY FAIR GENERAL INFORMATION**

- THE FAIR BOARD RESERVES THE RIGHT TO AMEND OR ADD TO THESE RULES & REGULA-TIONS AS ITS JUDGEMENT MAY DETERMINE.
- All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the Washington County Agricultural Fair, Inc. The interpretation of the rules and regulations of the Washington County Agricultural Fair, Inc. shall be made by the Fair management and the interpretation and decision of the Fair management of the rules and regulations shall be a final and non-appealable decision.
- NO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES are permitted to be brought onto the Fairgrounds. The Fair Board reserves the right to punish those in violation of this rule. Violators may be escorted off the fairgrounds.
- NO SMOKING IN THE BARNS OR EXHIBIT HALLS.
- Reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits on display from all injury and damage, but the Fair is not in any way to be held responsible for accidents, loss or damage by water, fire, theft or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.
   All entries with entry fees are to be mailed
- to WASHINGTON COUNTY FAIR, INC., 2151 NORTH MAIN STREET, WASHINGTON, PA 15301-6147. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor to make known the proper name of the articles or breed of livestock he/she is entering. Any item entered improperly will be disqualified to receive a prize; but judges will mark the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner to avoid the same mistake in the future.
- Entries will be made according to classification. All livestock shall be purebred, unless otherwise stated, and registered in the name of the exhibitor.
- 8. Premiums, as listed, may be given for meritorious exhibits. In the case where there is no competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. Same rule applies where there are fewer entries in a class than number of premiums offered.
- Livestock exhibitors cannot enter more than 2 entries in one class and only one entry in group classes. Anything other than livestock, 2 entries to a class (Dept. 3 Feeder Calves exempt from the rule). If housing capacity is reached, the Fair has the right to limit entries.
- 10. The decision of the judges shall be final in all cases except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation, or collusion not discovered at the time of award is proven, In such, the superintendent, fair board or such referee as appointed may make the decision. The cases may not be appealed to the fair management from whose decision there can be no appeal.
- 11. Exhibitors will be expected to display or parade their animals as directed by the superintendent to accept the stall assigned without controversy, to keep their animals in an attractive appearance, and to cooperate with the department in every way that may serve to increase the educational value of the show.
- Exhibitors of livestock must inform themselves as to when their livestock will be judged.

Stock must be in the ring promptly on call and failure to comply with the order renders exhibitors liable to be ruled out of competing.

- 13. NO OUT OF STATE EXHIBITORS WILL BE ACCEPTED. All animals are Washington County except sheep which can be Washington County and Greene County. All entries in the halls must be grown, produced, or made since the last fair.
- 14. Superintendents of a department reserve the right to refuse to accept any entry and to bar from competition animals, vegetables, flowers, poultry, products and manufactured articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition.
- 15. The Fair management may, at any time, order the removal of any exhibit or part of an exhibit in bad condition.
- 16. Where awarded ribbons are stolen or destroyed, the exhibitor may receive a duplicate at the close of the Fair, which shall be supplied by the Fair, free of charge.
- 17. During the judging, exhibit buildings (except the livestock area) will be closed to everyone except Fair officials, judges and necessary attendants. No exhibitor, nor their agent, shall communicate with the judge during judging, except to answer questions proposed by the judges. Any exhibitor interfering with the judges while making awards shall forfeit any premiums to which he/she would otherwise be entitled.
- All livestock offered for premiums must have been the property of the owner for thirty (30) days or longer.
- 19. Should any animal awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prizes shall move into the next higher position if, in the opinion of the judges, the animals are worthy of such prizes.
- 20. Decorations with ribbons or ornaments previously won by animals at shows shall be prohibited until after the awards have been made in their respective class by the judges.
- 21. Over-fitting of animals will be discriminated against. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of an animal will disqualify it from competition.
- 22. When an exhibition is in the ring, each animal must be under halter and in charge by owner or employee.
- 23. Joint ownership considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.
- 24. Exhibitors must have health and registration papers available through the end of the fair. ALL REGISTRATION PAPERS WILL BE CHECKED BY THE SUPERINTENDENTS. THEIR DECISION WILL BE FINAL.
- 25. Every exhibit accepted for premiums must be plainly marked, showing the name of the exhibit. In the case of livestock, the breed name must be shown on cards large enough to read. The livestock in the stall/pen must be of the breed identified on the sign. One large sign to designate the group will be satisfactory. However, the award winnings must be placed in the stall or pen of the individual winners for the duration of the Fair or show and in the case

of poultry, entry tags showing species must be plainly exhibited on each coop and winning stickers must appear on such entry tags showing winners. Failure to comply with the regulation will result in forfeiture of premiums.

- 26. NO PARKING ON THE MAIN GROUNDS. PLEASE use the parking lots. Park at your own risk.
- 27. No exhibit may be removed prior to the official release time for such exhibits, unless written permission for removal is first obtained from the Fair management. Any exhibitor who removed an exhibit, or any portion of an exhibit in violation of this rule shall forfeit premium monies for any and all exhibits entered in the Fair to which that exhibitor might otherwise have been entitled. Stall card must remain on pen prior to 12:01AM Sunday, August 20, 2023.
- 28. ALL PREMIUMS WILL BE MAILED. Premiums are payable by Bank Check. Premium checks are null and void after November 21, 2023. KINDLY CASH YOUR CHECKS IMMEDIATELY.
- CAMPING TRAILER fees must be prepaid and accompany your entry blank. There is a \$250 fee for camping trailers with full hookup (Rows A & B). Electric only and all others will be \$200.00. Any questions, please call Bill McGowan. Park your camper at your own risk. Utilities will not be turned on until 12PM, Thursday, August 10, 2023. NO CAMPFIRES ARE PERMITTED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS. NO REFUNDS.
   No REFUNDS.
- 30. No tie-outs in campgrounds or parking lots.
- 31. No pets permitted on the Fairgrounds with exception of service animals as recognized by the ADA with paperwork.
- 32. All persons who enter upon the Fairgrounds and use the facilities on said grounds for purpose of exhibiting, displaying, competing or in any manner participating in the Fair do so at their own risk. The Washington County Agricultural Fair will not be liable for any personal injury or property damage suffered by any person visiting the Fair irrespective of how such injury or damage occurs. The

Washington County Agricultural Fair will not intentionally show or permit to be shown, any dangerous attractions on the grounds. However, the showing of certain attractions require that spectators be reasonably watchful of the conduct of children and though the Washington County Agricultural Fair will take every precaution. It will not be responsible for any personal injury or property damage suffered by reason of any attraction shown or exhibited during the fair.

- 33. No market livestock entry exhibited in this year's fair is permitted to be exhibited in this year's open or youth breeding classes.
- 34. Absolutely no animals will be unloaded on the fairgrounds without being checked by a superintendent first.
- 35. Exhibitors participating in the 4-H and FFA market livestock program will also abide by the rules established by the Washington County Junior Livestock Committee.
- 36. Exhibition animals in Fair cannot be taken to campground or parking lot. Violators subject to disciplinary action.
- 37. No mounted cameras allowed around pens or halls.
- Washington County Agricultural Fair Inc. is not associated with or recognized as a sanctioned livestock show.
- 39. Exhibitors wishing to put a tent up should only be a 12 ft. x 12 ft. in size. Nothing larger.

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### ANIMAL HEALTH REGULATIONS IMPORTANT: ALL REQUIRED HEALTH PAPERS MUST BE CHECKED BEFORE UNLOADING

Official identification of animals is required. All animals must be free of infections and contagious diseases. Superintendents and Fair Board have the right to dismiss any animal with a questionable health issue such as ringworm, warts, worms, etc. In the event that a sick animal is found on the fairgrounds, a veterinarian will be called and the owner will be responsible for the veterinarian bill. The Fair Board reserves the right to dispose of any <u>dead</u> animals. <u>A 2023 Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) Issued Within 60 Days of the Event is Required</u> Be sure to use only grooming products that are approved for use on meat and dairy animals when fitting your animals for show. Unapproved products may contain ingredients that result in unacceptable residues in the meat or milk. If you are not certain that a product is residue safe and approved for use on meat or dairy animals, do not use it! \*\*Important! \*\* If upon slaughter treatment with drugs, biologics, or any chemical from fitting product is the cause of condemnation of a carcass, the loss of the carcass and any other damages will be borne by the exhibitor.

#### **GUIDELINES FOR CARE OF ANIMALS**

It is the responsibility of each exhibitor to care for animals in a manner that is responsible and ethical. The following are some guidelines for the treatment of animals exhibited at the Washington County Agricultural Fair: Restraining Animals - Animals should be tied or penned in a manner that will not hurt the animal or restrict its breathing in any way. Animals should be tied so that all four feet are firmly on the ground and they have enough room to stand and lie down comfortably. Animals should be tied so that they are not able to injure animals tied near them. Animals unaccustomed to each other should not be penned together. Handling - Any type of rough handling that could harm the animal is prohibited. The use of whips, canes, and show sticks should be restricted to showing only and then be used only to guide the animals, not punish them. Remember, animals will respond quicker and better to quiet, gentle handling, than loud, rough handling. Bedding - All animals should have bedding that is dry and clean. Pens should be cleaned regularly to keep the animals clean and comfortable. If non-traditional bedding such as carpeting is used, it should be regularly cleaned (at least twice daily) to keep the pen free from manure. Feeding & Water - Animals should be well fed and have access to clean water regularly. Realizing that many market animals must have restricted amounts of feed to maintain the proper weight, animals must be fed adequate amounts of feed to meet the animal's basic requirements. Animals not allowed reasonable access to feed and water will be disgualified from the show. Transportation - Animals should be transported in a way that is both safe and considerate of the animal's well being. Blanket/Sweat Collars - Any type of material such as blankets or sweat collars should be large enough to permit normal body functions such as breathing, eating, drinking or laying down. Health - It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to provide proper health care for their animals through routine inspection and consultation with health care professionals. The improper or illegal use of drugs or antibiotics is prohibited. If medication is indicated, be sure to follow the label directions and allow more than the stated withdrawal time.

#### SWINE HEALTH RULES

- The Breeding Swine exhibition has been canceled for the 2023 Fair with the intent of protecting exhibitor's swine, and per special exhibition requirements instituted by the PA Department of Agriculture Bureau of Animal Health.
- 2023 Certificate of Veterinary Inspection within 14 days.
   Department superintendents are responsible for checking all required health certificates and have the final judgement in resolving any dispute.
- 3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (a statement of this is printed on the CVI). Tag number must be recorded on the CVI.
- 4. All market swine must have an 840 ear tag. If PA Bred must be an 840 RFID tag and a plastic stamped ear tag. Pure Bred: Registration papers must be in Exhibitor's name. SHOWMANSHIP – The exhibitors animal shown in confirmation must be the animal used in Showmanship.
- 5. To show at the Fair, all hogs must have an 840 tag be bred. It must have an 840 RFID tag.
- 6. ALL MARKET SWINE EXHIBITED SHÅLL MOVE DIRECTLY TO A RECOGNIZED SLAUGHTER ES-TABLISHMENT AND MUST BE SLAUGHTERED.

POULTRY & PIGEONS A-1 Test Must Be Done 30 Days Before the Show 1. All Pennsylvania poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, and upland game birds entering an exhibition must bear an official PDA-issued leg band. Ratites must be identified with a neck band or an electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader). Pigeons and doves must bear a unique individual identification leg band but do not have to be identified with an official PDA leg band. 2. An Owner-endorsed Poultry Health Certificate or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (health certificate) must accompany all Pennsylvania poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, upland game birds, and ratites; and pigeons' doves; and hatching eggs. The certificate must include the following:

Name and location of exhibition; and

 Name, address, and telephone number of the owner; and A statement that the entries and the flock of origin and free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases; and
 A description of the birds/hatching eggs; and

 Owner signature and date of that signature. 3. Avian Influenza Clean Testing and Verification (all samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian):

 All poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl upland game birds, and ratites, (pigeons/doves excluded), and their hatching eggs for exhibition must originate from a flock in which a random, representative sample of a minimum of 30 birds, 3 weeks of age or older, were tested for avian influenza within the 30 days prior to opening date of the exhibition. The birds or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If there are fewer than 30 birds in the flock, test all birds. For waterfowl, cloacal swab samples must be collected for testing, and the swabs may be tested using PCR techniques. Swabs from geese and ducks may not be combined in a tube for testing. Birds shall not be comingled with untested or A1-positive birds after negative samples have been collected and before the show. 4. Pullorum-typhoid Testing and Verification (pigeons/doves and waterfowl excluded for exhibition). (All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian):

 Poultry, including chickens, turkeys, upland game birds and ratites (waterfowl excluded) and their hatching eggs must originate from a flock in good standing on the NPIP Pullorum-typhoid Clean Program (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants) and the birds must be accompanied by an NPIP-93 form with that flocks NPIP number, or from a flock in good standing on the PA Pullorum Equivalent Program. The birds or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If the rapid whole-blood plate agglutination test was done, the most recent NPIP 9-2 form or state equivalent form must accompany the birds or hatching eggs (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If birds are less than one year of age and originate from a NPIP Clean hatchery, they do not have to be tested for pullorum-typhoid if they are accompanied by an NPIP 9-3 form from that hatchery and any additions to the flock were also from NPIP Clean sources. The NPIP number must be noted on the report for NPIP Pullorum-typhoid clean flocks; OR

• All individual birds (pigeons/doves and waterfowl excluded) for exhibition (maximum of 300) must have had a pullorum-typhoid test within the 90 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition. The birds must be accompanied by the most recent test report, or state equivalent form for the rapid test (copies acceptable). Test results must be negative. The following age restrictions apply to comply with NPIP standards:

- Chickens shall be tested at 4 months of age or older
  Turkeys shall be tested at 12 weeks of age or older.
  Game birds shall be tested at 4 months of age or older,
- or upon sexual maturity, which ever comes first.
  Ratites shall be tested at 12 months of age or older.
- All birds not meeting these age restrictions at the time of sampling are exempt from pullorum-typhoid testing requirements.

#### HORSE HEALTH RULES- PENNSYLVANIA HORSES:

- 1. 1. 2023 Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued. Equine infections Anemia (EIA) test results & date of the test must be included on the CVI.
- All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (a statement of this is pre-printed on the CVI). Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the exhibition grounds.
- 3. All equine animals must test negative for EIA by an official test within the 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). The CVI shall specify the date of sample collection, date of results and results of the EIA Test, along with the accession number and the name of the testing laboratory. Foals less than 6 months of age accompanied by a dam which meets the above requirements are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.
- A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age & older. However, if a mare was currently vaccinated against rabies when she foaled, the foal is not required to be vaccinated until six months of age and with a second vaccination administered two-four weeks later. All vaccine label directions must be followed. and all rabies vaccinated equine animals must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. The certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the original rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.
- 5. PA 4-H Horse & Pony Rules require that all horses and ponies entered in 4-H Horse Show must be vaccinated against rabies at least one month, but not more than 12 months, before the opening date of the fair. (Re-vaccination is required each year.) Exhibitors can present a statement signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian stating that the animals were vaccinated. Proof of vaccination may appear on the health certificate.

#### **GOAT HEALTH RULES**

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- 1. The date to be used for computing all health regulation ages and deadlines is the date of the Saturday of the opening of the fair.
- 2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (a statement of this is printed on the CVI).
- 2023 Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 60 days.
- 4. Individual official animal identification is required for all goats. Official ID includes:
- A USDA ear tag with a US shield; or
- A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. a scrapie tattoo (only for herds enrolled in the USDA Voluntary Scrapie Herd Certification Program); or
- A breed registration tattoo if the animals are accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.

#### SHEEP HEALTH RULES

- 1. 2023 certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) issued within 60 days.
- Department superintendents are responsible for checking all paper work and have the final judgement in resolving any dispute.
   All animals must be free of infectious and con-
- All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (this statement is pre-printed on the CVI). Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the exhibition grounds.
- 4. Individual official animal identification is required for all sheep. Official ID includes:
- · A USDA ear tag with a US shield; or
- A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. a scrapie tattoo (only for flocks enrolled in the USDA Voluntary Scrapie Flock Certification Program); or
- A breed registration tattoo if the animals are accompanied by a registration certificate (copy acceptable) and the tattoo is legible.
- 5. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older (market sheep are exempt from this vaccination requirement). All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated sheep must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

#### CATTLE HEALTH RULES

- 2023 Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 60 days of the event is required. Department superintendents are responsible for checking all heath certificates and have the final judgement in resolving any dispute.
- All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (a statement of this is printed on the CVI). Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the exhibition grounds.
- 3. Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID ear tag or other unique identification device approved by PDA. A USDA- issued National Uniform Ear tagging system (NUES) tag having a US Shield "840"; or a 15-digit animal identification number ear tag starting with "840" (including RFID); or other official identification approved by PDA. (Brands and breed registration with tattoos are not acceptable).
- 4. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed Veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older (market cattle are exempt from this vaccination requirement).
- 5. All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated cattle must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate, or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

All entries shall be approved prior to the Fair by a member of Pennsylvania Department of Education, Agriculture or Family & Consumer Science staff, or their designated representative. **4-H and FFA Livestock Exhibitor Dress Code** 

In an overall effort to improve the image of the Livestock Shows and Market Livestock Sale, 4-H & FFA members are to dress appropriately for both the show and the sale. Attire for the show ring and the job at hand should fit properly without being too loose or too tight. No T-shirts, halter tops, tank tops or shorts permitted before showing. All exhibitors are required to wear a collared shirt and jeans or slacks. Jeans do not have to be dark colored jeans, but are not to have any holes or tears that show visible skin. RULES: Participant must be a junior-age amateur baker [under age 18] who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person. Entrant must not have won 1st place in this contest at any other fair in Pennsylvania in the current year. Entire must be six (6) individual size portions of the same item presented on a disposable plate, cardboard or other food-safe, disposable setting (all pans, plates, and dishes are considered to be disposable, and will not be returned). Entry must be *made from scratch*—no pre-packaged ingredients (mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frostings, fillings, etc.). All ingredients and decorations must be edible. At least two (2) PA-preferred products or ingredients purchased locally from a farm, mill, or other hometown business must be used in the recipe. Examples of qualifying ingredients are grains (such as milled grains), farm fresh eggs, locally grown fruits and vegetables, local dairy milk or cream, or any grocery item that is PA-preferred—a list of qualifying ingredients can be found at RAAGPAPreferredpa.gov). Recipes must be submitted with the entry, typed, or *neatly printed* on an 8-1/2" x 11" white paper. Recipe must list all ingredients. quantities of ingredients, and directions for preparation and baking. The name of each PA-preferred or locally sourced ingredient must be clearly designated with the source that grew or made the product. More than one sheet of paper can be used, if needed, but the name, address, and phone number of entrant must be printed on the backside of each page. All recipes become the property of the fair and/or the PA Farm Show and will not be returned. Refrigeration is not available at the fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate this in the recipe instructions. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned, or otherwise distributed for consumption after final judging (for food safety reasons).

Sponsored by PA State Association of County Fairs - \*All entries MUST be pre-entered. \*Entries should be brought to the Show Tent with recipe on Saturday, August 12, 2023 between 9:45 AM and 10:55 AM for judging to begin promptly at 11:00 AM. \*Winners will be announced at the end of judging. \*The first-place winner will be required to enter the PA Farm Show Contest. If unable to do so, the second-place winner is eligible.

**RULES:** Participant must be an *amateur baker* who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person. Entrant must not have won 1st place in this contest at any other fair in Pennsylvania in the current year. Entire entry must be *made from scratch*—no pre-packaged ingredients (mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frostings, fillings, etc.). All ingredients and decorations must be edible. Recipe must feature chocolate or cocoa as the main ingredient. Entry must be a <u>layered</u> chocolate cake. Entry must be frosted, and frosting must also be made from scratch. The entire cake entry must be submitted for judging on cardboard or other food-safe, disposable setting (all pans, plates, and dishes are considered to be disposable, and *will not be returned*). Recipes must be submitted with the entry, <u>typed or neatly printed</u> on an 8-1/2" x 11" white paper. Recipe must list all ingredients for both cake and frosting, quantities of ingredients, and directions for preparation and baking. More than one sheet of paper can be used, if needed, but the *name*, address, and phone number of entrant must be printed on the <u>backside of each page</u>. All recipes become the property of the Washington County Agricultural Fair and/or the PA Farm Show and *will not be returned*. Refrigeration is not available at the fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking *must indicate this* in the recipe instructions. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned, or otherwise distributed for consumption after final judging (for food safety reasons).

Entries in the 2D (flat) category would include but not limited to portraits and landscapes. Entries in the 3D category are more like sculptures.

· Submitted artwork will be judged on overall artistic merit, cleverness of subject, technique, originality, and skill. The natural color of the seeds and beans provides the only pigment to the pictures as no paint or dyes are allowed. Only seeds and beans that are used for crops that can be grown in Pennsylvania may be used. No portion of the seedpod is to be used in the artwork. The artwork is to be completely and exclusively created

from whole and unadulterated naturally colored seeds and beans. Seeds should be affixed permanently to the surface with a clear or invisible adhesive. No shellac or polyurethane coatings. Seed portion of artwork must be less than 3/4" thick (if work is mounted on 1/2" board, the total thickness of entry must be less than 1-1/4".) Seeds may be layered or partially layered on top of one another as long as the total thickness doesn't exceed 3/4".

There should not be glass or plastic covering the artwork.

- All Crop Art entries must be accompanied by an unsigned 4" by 6" legend with samples of the seeds used in the artwork clearly and neatly identified. Legend card should have descriptive title of artwork such as "Princess Leia" or "Rooster". Name, Age, and contact information of entrant must be clearly marked on back or bottom of artwork and back of legend card. 2D Crop Art entries are to be no larger than 400 square inches in area and mounted on a stiff flat board such as plywood with suitable hanging brackets attached on back. It is not necessary that the board be rectangular. Pictures may have frames but are not required. Edges of mounting board need not be seed covered but should be suitably finished. Front surface of mounting board must be completely covered with seeds. 3D Crop Art entries to be three-dimensional sculptures of whatever support material is chosen covered entirely with dry seeds and/or beans. Clay, foam, natural, or manmade objects may be used as the base material but no portion of this base is to be visible. No glue or supports are to be visible. Entire work must be covered with seeds so no props can be used. Work should be displayed on a board or support that is also completely covered with seeds. Entire installation must be inside a 16" x 16" x 16" area.
